Establishing a Commercially Successful Oil Mallee Industry

A partnership between the Central and Midwest Oil Mallee Regions, Kalannie Distillers and YYCMG (Inc.) has been successful in obtaining funding from the National Action Plan for salinity and water quality. The National Action Plan is a 50/50 state and commonwealth government initiative and is administered by the Northern Agricultural Catchment Council's (NACC) as part of Investment Plan 1.

The project will develop incentives to revegetate by establishing a commercially successful oil mallee industry and will run over 3 years with \$232,500 secured for the first year.



Funding in the first year will subsidise 200,000 oil mallee seedlings, return older mallee plantings to harvestable plantations by cutting large trees to mulch, and modify existing harvesting and distilling machinery to improve efficiencies.

There has been much interest from growers in the region's 100km radius from Kalannie and Canna, with the 1st year seedling subsidy program being oversubscribed.

Mulching of existing oil mallee stands by a contractor is set to start after Easter. More growers are invited to consider this option on their existing mallees that are too large to harvest.

The first stage of modifications on the Kalannie Distillers' harvester is nearing completion with preliminary commissioning trials proving to be very promising. First distillation trials are due to commence after Easter, with full oil

production expecting to resume after seeding.

Look out in local press for field days to be held this year to demonstrate harvesting process and cutting to mulch of existing large plantings.



Growers are welcome to contact Project Coordinator Jo Ashworth, 9666 1033, to discuss subsidies for mulching of existing stands to bring back into oil production, seedling subsidies over the next 2 years, and existing plantings suitable for harvesting.

An Evaluation of Engineering Options for Salinity in the Yarra Yarra Catch-

GHD Pty Ltd, are conducting a Yarra Yarra Catchment Regional Drainage and Water Management Evaluation project managed by the Department of Water (DoW). The project is part of DoW's Wheatbelt Drainage Evaluation Program established through funding from the National Action Plan on Salinity and Water Quality (jointly funded by State and Commonwealth Governments).

The objective of this study is to define and evaluate engineering options for salinity and surface water management in the Yarra Yarra Catchment.

The study will characterise the catchment to form a baseline against which to measure and compare outcomes of the engineering op-

tions evaluated. This will involve reviewing available information, site visits and simulated computer model scenarios (pre-European, existing conditions, maximum salinity and climate change).

The study will select water management engineering options for evaluation and analyse the suitability of those options for application within the Yarra Yarra Catchment.

On the 12th of April GHD held their first stakeholder consultation meeting at Dalwallinu to update landholders and community members on the project's progress and present options for preliminary analysis. The options selected for preliminary evaluation and analysis outlined at the meeting were:

- Main deep drainage
- Main shallow drainage/ Existing valley drainage
- Groundwater pumping, off site disposal
- Deep Drainage with near insitu disposal
- Alternative farming systems / vegetation
- Do Nothing

REPORT ON MEETINGS TO ESTABLISH AN ALLIANCE BETWEEN CATCHMENT STAKE HOLDERS IN THE MAIN CATCHMENT BASINS OF THE WHEATBELT OF W.A. written by Max Hudson

In early October 2005 relevant landholders were contacted to assess the interest in developing an alliance between the major drainage regions of the Wheat belt. Namely – Mortlock, Lockhart, Yilgarn, Dumbleyung, Salt River and Yarra Yarra.

The Alliance would act as a strong lobby group to access funds to develop regional drainage plans for Wheat Belt Catchments. Public meetings were held to gain support for this initiative.

Background

In a joint funding initiative the State and Federal Governments have committed \$316,000,000 for projects designed to reduce salinity and protect water quality in Western Australia. A significant amount of this funding has already been allocated to various Land Care projects in NRM regions. However, no significant funds have been allocated to meaningful projects to address salinity in the wheatbelt.

Considering 80% of the total funds (\$316,000,000) were originally earmarked for large integrated catchment salinity projects (Statement by John Holly NRM secretariat boss AGWA 2003) we are concerned that a significant amount of the funding has been misdirected to small biodiversity based projects.

The Meetings

During October 2005 public meetings were held at Merredin, Corrigin and Dowerin to promote the forming of an Alliance between stake holders in Regional Catchments in the Wheat Belt. At each meeting a resolution was passed to form The Wheatbelt Catchment Alliance of W.A. (WCA) and two delegates were

elected to represent each of those Regions where the meetings were held. Other established groups i.e. Dumbleyung, Yarra Yarra and Salt River passed similar resolutions at their own general meetings.

An inaugural meeting of delegates held at Quairading on the 24th of October established a constitution, elected office bearers and passed some important pending resolutions.

Outcomes

As an immediate result of forming the Catchment Alliance representatives were invited to meet with the Joint State and Federal Steering Committee for NRM (JSC) to negotiate a better deal for regional catchment initiatives such as the one developed by the Yarra Yarra Group.

The outcome of these discussions was that the Yarra Yarra Group was invited by the Joint Chairs, Kelly Pearce (Federal representative) and David Hartley (State executive director of Natural Resources) to develop a proposal to access \$2,600,000 of Government funds over two years to develop the first stage of their regional drainage initiative.

Two representatives one from the State and one from the Commonwealth NRM bodies provided assistance for Yarra Yarra to develop their proposal.

During the compiling of the project it was revealed that NACC had included a substantial amount of this funding in an interim budget for Stage 2 of their Investment Plan.

To build on this strategy on a cross regional basis the other five Regional Catchments (Lockhart, Mortlock, Yilgarn, Dumbleyung and Salt River) will need to access funds to conduct an assessment of the landscape so that an acceptable plan can be developed to carry out the necessary on ground works for these

The Bottom line is that unless landholders take the initiative then nothing will be done

As a precursor to the Yarra Yarra project plan being funded exhaustive investigations had to be done to reassure Government agencies (who are protecting the public interest) that these plans would produce satisfactory outcomes with little risk to the environment.

At a meeting of Wheatbelt Catchment Alliance Committee on Monday 27th Feb 06, David Hartley Executive Director of Agricultural Resources pledged to provide funds for a consultant to prepare the necessary application to finance an investigation of the valley floors of the Lockhart, Yilgarn, Mortlock and Dumbleyung Catchments to determine what actions need to take place to address drainage problems in each of these Regional Catchments.

Until this investigatory work has been done Government Agencies have made it quite clear there is no way funds will be approved to do any earth works.

Once adequate funds have been assured then the Shire Councils in each Catchment Region will be approached to suggest the formation of Regional Councils of Local Government to oversee the development of these projects.

Yarra Yarra already have developed a working model that has been accepted by the system which could be applied in other catchments.

Are you planning of sowing lucerne this year?

Lucerne or alfalfa provides a multi beneficial opportunity for mixed farming enterprises in the northern agricultural region. Lucerne is a deep rooted perennial legume which compliments annual pasture production by using excess water in the soil profile for out of season pasture production. A lucerne pasture phase adds value to animal and crop production in the following ways:

The high water use of lucerne reduces rising watertable and associated waterlogging and salinity enabling farmers to reclaim and continue farming land. Deep rooted access to water enable the production of a more stable protein rich feed supply throughout the year for animal production. A lucerne phase also offers an alternative weed cleaning and herbicide resistant weed control rotation for frequent croppers with the added benefits of improved soil fertility and structure for subsequent crops.

Do YOU Want Assistance with Investigating Management Options for Salty Land???

The Liebe Group in collaboration with the Department of Agriculture WA has been successful in obtaining funding from the National Landcare Program for a project entitled "Agronomic package and benchmarking for mildly or periodically saline land allowing for viable pasture and cropping options."

What a mouthful!!! - What it actually means is that it allows a development officer to be employed at Three Springs DAWA office to work with farmers in the Liebe Group, Morawa Farm Improvement Group and Yarra Yarra Catchment.

The project aims to work with farmers to investigate management or amelioration options for the moderately or periodically saline part of the landscape. This may include investigating annual and perennial pasture or crop varieties, soil structure amelioration (ie gypsum for sodic soils) and/or ice-plant control.



The project aims to work with 30 sites across the three involved groups. Each of the sites will be benchmarked so that initial soil conditions, especially salinity can be measured and kept on record. The main aim of the project is for farmers to be able to gain some production from land that may be fenced off due to salinity but may only be moderately affected.

NACC Committee Awarding in the Catchment


