



Weed Watch

TAMARISK- Athel pine is a *Weed of National Significance*. It is regarded as one of the worst weeds in Australia because of its invasiveness, potential for spread, and economic and environmental impacts. Athel pine affects the pastoral industry by forming dense stands along inland rivers. It consumes water more quickly than native plants, thereby reducing the number and quality of watering holes. It concentrates salt, which is excreted by its leaves. This makes the ground beneath athel pines more salty and excludes native pasture grasses and other salt-sensitive plants.

SPINY RUSH-

Spiny rush invades lowland grassland and grassy woodland, riparian vegetation, freshwater wetland (seasonal), and saline and subsaline wetlands. It occurs initially in waterways and other low-lying areas, particularly in saline areas, but can spread to higher ground and colonise areas of low fertility.

Community Water Grants

The Australian Government's Community Water Grants (CWG) programme offers grants of up to \$50,000 to help local community organisations save, recycle or improve the health of their local water resources. Larger grants of between \$100,000 and \$250,000 are also available for projects and applicants that meet additional eligibility criteria.

Grants are available for projects related to:

- water savings and efficiency
- recycling water for use
- treating water for discharge to the environment.

Community Water Grants are open to most community based organisations that want to take action by implementing practical, on-the-ground projects that help solve local water problems.

Eligible groups include:

- rural organisations
- local government
- schools, universities and childcare facilities
- Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander corporations, councils or incorporated associations
- fundraising organisations such as Rotary or Lions
- sporting and recreation clubs
- religious organisations
- health care organisations such as nursing homes
- environmental and conservation groups.

Individuals and firms may be eligible for CWG if their proposed activities have a very high public benefit.
